Income Tax Reminder

Permit Parking Spaces Available - East Main Lot

The Village of Barnesville has several permit parking spaces available in the East Main Street Parking Lot, located between Cheffy's and Avenues of Barnesville. The cost is \$20 a month or \$120 a year. Parking permits are valid Monday through Saturday 8am-6pm, except special events and for maintenance. Permits are sold on a first come basis. Spring into Compliance: Ensure Your Property is Well-Maintained

As the weather warms up, spring is the ideal time to assess your property and ensure it complies with the Property Maintenance Code (Chapter 1381). Property owners should be proactive in adhering to this code, which requires that all premises and structures be kept in good repair and free of any nuisances, safety hazards, or unsanitary conditions.

Buildings must be weather-tight, free of deterioration, and well-maintained to ensure it remains safe and habitable. Additionally, inoperable or junk vehicles must be stored in fully enclosed buildings or in locations out of public view, or else they must be removed from the premises entirely. Grass and yards need to be maintained and free of high grass or weeds. Violations of these requirements will result in a 30-day notice to abate being issued.

Spring also provides an opportunity to check your lawn care equipment. If you typically hire someone to mow your lawn, now is the time to confirm their services or seek out a lawn care provider for the upcoming season. By staying ahead of these tasks, you'll be able to keep your property looking its best and in full compliance with local codes.

Stay on top of property maintenance this spring and summer, and avoid costly fines or court appearances, and repairs by taking action now.

Residents are also encouraged to take part in the **FREE** annual clean up day that is offered by JB Green Team and being held on Saturday May, 3, 2025 from 9am-1pm at the Barnesville Depot. This provides a perfect opportunity to clear out junk and clutter from your property.

The Village of Barnesville successfully tested the CodeRED Emergency Alert Notification system on March 1, 2025. This test was only sent to residents that reside within the corporation limit of Barnesville. Within seconds the village was able to send out 3,265 phone calls (2,072 numbers reached out of those registered), 728 text messages, and 230 emails. Along with the alert being posted onto the Village Facebook, X, Village Website, and the CodeRED Mobile App.

For those that did not get this test message that live within the village limits your encouraged to ensure you are registered for CodeRED and to check to see if your information is up-to-date within the database. You can do this by texting "BELMONT" to 99411 or go to www.alerts.barnesvilleohio.com.

371.01 Right of Way in Crosswalk

- (a) When traffic control signals are not in place, not in operation or are not clearly assigning the right of way, the driver of a vehicle shall yield the right of way, slowing down or stopping if need be to so yield or if required by Section 313.09, to a pedestrian crossing the roadway within a crosswalk when the pedestrian is upon the half of the roadway upon which the vehicle is traveling, or when the pedestrian is approaching so closely from the opposite half of the roadway as to be in danger.
- (b) No pedestrian shall suddenly leave a curb or other place of safety and walk or run into the path of a vehicle which is so close as to constitute an immediate hazard.
- (c) Subsection (a) hereof does not apply under the conditions stated in Section 371.03(b).
- (d) Whenever any vehicle is stopped at a marked crosswalk or at any unmarked crosswalk at an intersection to permit a pedestrian to cross the roadway, the driver of any other vehicle approaching from the rear shall not overtake and pass the stopped vehicle.
- (e) Except as otherwise provided in this subsection, whoever violates this section is guilty of a minor misdemeanor. If, within one year of the offense, the offender previously has been convicted of or pleaded guilty to one predicate motor vehicle or traffic offense, whoever violates this section is guilty of a misdemeanor of the fourth degree. If, within one year of the offense, the offender previously has been convicted of two or more predicate motor vehicle or traffic offenses, whoever violates this section is guilty of a misdemeanor of the third degree.

If the offender commits the offense while distracted and the distracting activity is a contributing factor to the commission of the offense, the offender is subject to the additional fine established under Section 303.991 of the Traffic Code. (ORC 4511.46)

Barnesville Sidewalk Replacement Loan Progam




Barnesville Village Council is offering a loan program to residents in an effort to replace deteriorated sidewalks. The program offers zero percent loans to replace the walks that travel parallel with Village streets and will include curbs and driveway aprons. The village will select and pay the contractor and then send a monthly invoice to the property owner. All rules, regulations, and specifications of the village will be followed. Applicants must have not had any delinquent water bills over the past 24 months, unpaid Village Income taxes, or unpaid fines.

At 10:30 PM on February 25, 2025, Barnesville police attempted to stop a vehicle speeding recklessly on Bond Ave/SR 800. The vehicle fled, leading to a pursuit through Hendrysburg, North Road, and onto Belmont Ridge in Harrison County. The suspect vehicle collided head-on with the patrol car, causing it to catch fire and be destroyed. The two suspects fled on foot, with one apprehended by K9 Croc. The other suspect was found and arrested after aerial assistance from the Ohio State Highway Patrol. The suspects were treated at Harrison Community Hospital and taken to Belmont County Jail. No officers were injured. Charges are pending approval from the Belmont County Prosecutor's Office. Assistance was provided by Belmont County Sheriff's Office, Harrison County Sheriff's Office, Ohio State Highway Patrol, and St. Clairsville Police Department. Chief Rocky Sirianni and the Barnesville Police Department are grateful for the assistance of all involved law enforcement agencies and emergency personnel.

Ohio Outdoor Fire Laws: What You Need to Know

Ohio Revised Code 1503.18 Regarding Kindled Fires

O.R.C. 1503.18 is under the authority of the Ohio Division of Forestry.

This law prohibits outdoor open burning statewide in unincorporated areas during the months of March, April, May, October, and November between the hours of 6 a.m. and 6 p.m.

This ban includes burning of yard waste, trash, and debris, even in a proper burn barrel.

During spring, wildfire danger is high before plants have turned green, and in fall, fire danger is high due to abundant dry leaves and dead grass. Warm, windy weather in both seasons also contribute to elevated fire risk. Always be sure to use a proper burn barrel when burning outdoors during legal hours.

EPA Basics for Homeowners

Materials NEVER to be burned at any time or any place in Ohio:

- Food Waste
- Dead Animals
- Materials containing rubber, grease, asphalt, or made from petroleum

OTHER RESTRICTIONS:

- Fires must be more than 1,000 feet from neighbor's inhabited building
- No burning when air pollution alert, warning, or emergency is in effect
- Fire/smoke cannot obscure visibility on roadway, railways, or airfields
- No waste generated off the premises may be burned
- No burning within village or city limits or restricted areas


The Birth of a Pothole



SUB-BASE



As temperatures rise, the ground returns to normal level but the pavement often remains raised. This creates a gap between the pavement and the ground below it.

When vehicles drive over this cavity, the pavement surface cracks and falls into the hollow space, leading to the birth of another pothole.

Understanding Water Main Breaks in Ohio: Causes, Repairs, and Safety Measures

Water main breaks are a common issue faced by many communities in Ohio, often causing disruptions in daily life. These breaks occur when a section of the large pipes that carry water from treatment plants to homes and businesses ruptures, leading to water loss, service interruptions, and the potential contamination of drinking water.

What Causes Water Main Breaks?

Several factors contribute to water main breaks in Ohio. The state's older infrastructure is a primary reason, as many water systems are decades old, with pipes that have worn down due to age and constant pressure. Freezing temperatures during the winter months can also put extra stress on water mains, leading to cracks or breaks as the ground shifts and pipes contract. Additionally, sudden changes in water pressure, ground movement, or even construction activity can damage underground water lines.

Repairing Water Main Breaks

When a water main breaks, immediate repairs are needed to restore service. The process typically begins with locating the break, which may involve shutting off water flow to the area and excavating around the damaged pipe. Once the break is identified, crews replace or repair the broken section. Depending on the severity of the damage, repairs can take anywhere from a few hours to several days. After repairs are completed, the water is tested to ensure it meets safety standards.

Boil Orders: Why They're Issued and What to Do

After a water main break, a water boil order may be issued to protect public health. When water pressure is lost or contaminated, bacteria and other harmful microorganisms can enter the water supply. Boiling water kills these potential contaminants, making it safe for consumption.

If a boil order is issued, here's what you need to do:

- 1. **Boil water for at least 1 minute** at a rolling boil. For higher altitudes, boil for 3 minutes.
- 2. Use boiled water for drinking, cooking, brushing teeth, and preparing baby formula.
- 3. Avoid using tap water for consumption, unless it has been boiled.
- 4. Be cautious of doing laundry as staining could occur, due to discoloration.
- 5. Once the boil order is lifted, run tap water for a few minutes to clear any potential contaminants.

Understanding the causes and impact of water main breaks can help you stay prepared during these events. By following safety guidelines and proper boiling procedures, you can protect your health while utilities work to restore service.



Golf Cart Information & Inspection Information

As the weather improves, we expect an increase in the use of golf carts on public roadways within Barnesville. Anyone operating a golf cart on these roads must adhere to the rules and regulations outlined in Village Ordinance Chapter 345. To ensure compliance with Ohio state laws for motor vehicles and local ordinances, golf carts must undergo an inspection. This inspection is necessary for owners or operators to obtain a title and license for their golf cart. Inspections are available for \$50. ASK YOURSELF:

What do phone scams look or sound like?

Scammers may pose as a well-known government agency or business, such as the IRS, Social Security, an online retailer or a tech-support company. They may claim that you owe money, that they're updating their files or that your account has been locked; in return, they need money or personal information to make things right. They often disguise the number appearing on caller ID to make it seem legitimate.


- Do not provide any personal information or click on any links.
- Never respond to unexpected requests for your personal information.
- If you think the call might be legitimate, hang up and call back using a phone number you know is correct.
- Use the information on the company's official website, not the number listed on Caller ID or in an unexpected email or text.
- Don't allow remote access to your phone or computer, or download unknown software.

Red flags of a phone scam

- You are pressured to act immediately.
- Payment is requested by gift card, cryptocurrency, peerto-peer payment, wire transfer or prepaid money card.
- You're told not to tell friends or family about the conversation.
- You're told you've won something you didn't enter to win, or you're unexpectedly being given money.

Robocall smarts

DO:

- Register your phone number(s) with the Do Not Call Registry online at www.DoNotCall.gov or by phone at 888-382-1222. Remember: If you're registered and someone calls trying to sell you something, it's a good sign that the call may not be legitimate.
- Research services offered by your phone provider to block unwanted calls.
- Install an app on your cellphone to block or warn of suspicious calls.
- Add trusted phone numbers to your contacts.
- Limit how often you share your phone number.
- If you don't recognize the number, allow the call to go to voicemail and review the message later.

DON'T:

- Answer an incoming call when you don't recognize the number.
- Provide personal or financial information over the phone.
- Interact with an unknown caller in any way; don't press numbers or speak to anyone.
- Call back unfamiliar phone numbers.
- Fully rely on caller ID.

Construction Began on the Barnesville Bike & Pedestrian Path



Construction has begun on the Barnesville Bike and Pedestrian Path, transforming a section of the former Baltimore and Ohio (B&O) Railroad track into a paved route for cyclists and pedestrians from East South Street to Bethesda Street.

The project includes bike/pedestrian signage, pavement markings, parking at the B&O Depot trailhead, and the restoration of the historic railroad tunnel beneath East Main and South Arch Streets. These upgrades will provide a safer, more accessible path for non-motorized traffic, connecting key areas of the village.
